New proficiency standards for NAPLAN will include four levels of achievement that will replace the numerical NAPLAN bands. From this year, parents and carers will get earlier, simpler, and clearer information about their child's academic achievements based on new proficiency. The numerical NAPLAN bands and the national minimum standard will be replaced by the following four levels of achievement:

- Exceeding
- \* Strong
- Developing
- \* Needs Additional Support.

The descriptors for each category will make it clear to parents what their child's literacy and numeracy skills are at the time of NAPLAN testing, and support discussions with us on their child's progress.

### **Lunchtime Clubs**

We again have a great lunchtime program for this term. There is quite an extensive list of lunchtime clubs and support programs for our students which are based on their interests and needs. These programs include: Happy POD, Drawing Club, Running club, Singing club, Green screen, Public speaking and more. Parents might want to speak to their child about attending one of these during the week. We also have Blue Court sport, twice a week, where our Year 6 peer leaders run sporting activities alternating between boy and girl participation days.

### Year 6 Students & their Staff Mentors

At Osborne, since 2007, we have matched every Year 6 student with a Staff Mentor. This enables the students to have another adult in the school, besides their teacher, with whom they can build a supportive relationship. It has proven to be an important wellbeing initiative for students, especially for some with additional social and emotional needs.

A couple of weeks ago when they were given the identity of their Mentor, the students wrote a letter to introduce themselves. Last week, all year 6 students shared a morning tea with their Staff Mentors. The morning tea allowed for some "getting to know you" time between the adults and students. We all enjoyed this time together.

As the year progresses, we have a small group morning tea each term, but depending on the students and their adult, often many small "touch base" catch-ups, lunch with Mentors, visits to classrooms, time helping their Mentor etc. The students tell us getting their Mentor is a special relationship that they look forward to having when they get to Year 6. The staff enjoy this opportunity for meeting and getting to know a couple of the Year 6 students as interesting individual people, not just one of the year sixers. We look forward to a great year with some profitable time spent together.

### **Child Safety Standards**

At Osborne Primary School, we are committed to acting in the best interests of our students and keeping them safe from harm. The School regards its child protection responsibilities as being of the utmost importance. This means that in practice we are focused on providing the necessary resources to ensure compliance with all relevant child protection legislation and regulations; and to maintaining a child safe culture.

The following principles underpin our commitment to child safety:

- All students deserve, as a fundamental right, safety and protection from all forms of abuse and neglect.
- Our school works in partnership with families and the community to ensure that they are engaged
  in decision-making processes, particularly those that have an impact on child safety and protection.
- All students have the right to a thorough and systematic education in all aspects of personal safety, in partnership with their parents/guardians/caregivers.
- All adults in our school, including teaching and non-teaching staff, volunteers and contractors as
  well as the broader school community have a responsibility to care for children and young people,
  to positively promote their wellbeing and to protect them from any kind of harm or abuse.
- The policies, guidelines and codes of conduct for the care, wellbeing and protection of students are based on honest, respectful and trusting relationships between adults and children and young people.
- Policies and practices demonstrate compliance with legislative requirements and cooperation with governments, the police and human services agencies.
- All persons involved in situations where harm is suspected or disclosed must be treated with sensitivity, dignity and respect.
- Staff, volunteers, contractors, parents/guardians and students should feel free to raise concerns about child safety, knowing these will be taken seriously by school leadership.
- Appropriate confidentiality will be maintained, with information being provided to those who have a right or a need to be informed, either legally or pastorally.

Osborne Primary School is committed to the continuous improvement of our Child Safe Program. The Program is regularly reviewed for overall effectiveness and to ensure compliance with all child protection related laws, regulations and standards. Our Child Safe Policy is available from the office and on our website. Please make an appointment to speak to a member of the Principal Class Team or notify police if you have any concerns about a child's safety.

### School Review

As part of the improvement cycle, each Victorian government school undertakes a review every four years. Schools complete a comprehensive self-evaluation against the Framework for Improving Student Outcomes (FISO 2.0) continua of practice. School reflection and self-evaluation helps identify what is working well, what needs to continue and which areas of the school's work may need to be improved or further developed. It informs decisions relating to priority-setting, initiatives, strategies and actions for improvement.

An independent analysis is also completed of a school's performance against their goals and targets in their school strategic plan. The review evaluates the school's strengths, areas for improvement and the impact of its improvement efforts. At the end of the review, a new four-year school strategic plan is created and endorsed by the school council. Osborne will be undertaking a school review in Term 2. Work on the self-evaluation has been untaken this term and we look forward to working through the review process with our community (through focus groups and surveys) and our appointed reviewer.

### Working with Children Checks (WWCC)

We encourage and value parental and community support at Osborne. There are many ways that parents, grandparents and friends can assist at our school. We encourage all parents to obtain a Working with Children's Check that will allow you to be very involved in your child's education. These checks are free for volunteers and will allow you to be involved in as many school events as you require.

Thinking mathematically, that is...







Play card and board games, add up shopping lists or read number plates or speed limits when driving in the car.


To further celebrate this wonderful day, we are holding a Whole School Maths Day celebration on Tuesday, March 14<sup>th</sup>, which is Pi Day!

Pi is the Greek mathematical letter relating to the ratio of the circumference of any circle to the diameter of that circle.




